Depending on your insurance coverage, here's how telehealth works.

WHAT IT'S USED FOR

- Consultation
- Diagnosis
- Exam follow up
- Review of lab work
- Mental health check
- Pain management
- Family planning
- Routine, low-risk prenatal visits

Through a phone call or video chat, physicians can connect with patients, talk about health concerns and determine what steps should be taken if further treatment is necessary. It's safe, private and a convenient way to ensure you get the care you need, when and where you need it.



INSURANCE

Medicare, Medicaid, and most private insurance companies cover telehealth visits. Check with your doctor to see what telehealth options are available through your insurance.

PRESCRIPTIONS

Medications can be prescribed by your doctor via telehealth. If the prescription is for a controlled substance, it must be prescribed using a two-way, interactive video connection.

Remember – telehealth <u>cannot</u> help in an emergency. For immediate treatment, call 9-1-1 or go to the nearest ER. Hospitals have taken every precaution to protect patients from COVID-19, so do not avoid going to the ER out of fear of the coronavirus.

For non-urgent treatment, contact your doctor and check in for your check-up today.
